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

As we move into July, the vast majority of fish species have spawned and are relocating for summer feeding. The emphasis shifts to deeper, offshore spots. That's not to say certain species cannot be caught in shallow water near the bank in particular environments or under certain weather conditions. 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COUNTY BY COUNTY REPORTS

CRAWFORD COUNTY

Pymatuning Lake

Dave @ Richter's Bait & Tackle; filed 6/27: I am still hearing about a lot of walleye catches — at least on the South End of the lake. Drifting and pulling worm harnesses along deep weed edges to depths of 16 feet or so; also trolling shadshape crankbaits. Channel catfish (aka silver cats) are being caught everywhere. Lots of perch — but you got to go through a many small ones to get some keepers. The crappies have been quiet; even the guys who fish only crappies are spending the entire day to catch a few to take home. Anglers are still catching those worn-out muskies left in the tailrace of the dam; these fish are being caught over and over. (See photo)

Duck-N-Drake; filed 6/27: The reports coming into the shop have been few; only hearing of the occasional walleye catch. Anglers continue to bring in big crappies to have them entered in the Crappie Madness – which runs until the last day of July. (See photo)

Russ @ Gateway Tackle; filed 6/27: Fish catches seem to have slowed down. I'm hearing of crappies being caught from the Andover Causeway at night. Also, walleyes are being taken on worm harnesses and Flicker Shads off Tuttle Point. And the same muskies are being caught and re-caught below the dam.



Stan Teitelbaum; filed 6/27: It was humid yesterday early morning but thanks to the wind, temperature became more comfortable as noon approached. Numbers of bass were down (maybe 5 before noon) on the South End – but length and weight were higher than weeks past. I tried a new spot and returned to one I had given up on. I love

Darl @ Blackwolfe Communications; filed 6/27: Late in the afternoon on Friday, Mari-

lyn and I headed to Pymatuning. I was hoping to make a comeback on the smallmouth bass after the whooping Marilyn put on me two weeks ago. With the heavy cloud cover, advancing rain front and full Strawberry Moon, I visualized this could be a banner evening on smallmouth. Started with topwater, but the chop was too much. Went to swimbaits and spinnerbaits. Nope. Broke out the

cranking rods. Of course, Marilyn wanted the 12-foot diving Timber Tiger in Emerald Green color she had used previously to catch those big Pymie smallmouth. Working it through the sparse deep weeds, she received a few pecks but she felt they were only perch. I decided to go deeper, with an old tri-lobe bill with near-vertical dive (can't recall the name) designed by Tom Seward – same individual who later designed the Timber Tiger Depth Control series. I fired



it to open water and cranked it slowly (no way to crank this baby fast) back to boat. As it hit the 14-foot breakline beside the boat, I paused it. A rod jolting smack! At first, I imagined it was a smallmouth until I saw a long body at about 10 feet in the clear water—at which point I thought it was a small musky. A few feet closer, I realized it was a walleye. Once in the net, we measured it at 23 inches. A few more C&R walleyes on crankbaits by casting to open water and working them back to the deep weed edge—but no smallmouth. However, with darkness approaching and rain starting ahead of schedule, our last stop was a gravel hump where Marilyn managed to crank in an 11-inch smallmouth—once again besting me in our smallmouth quest on Pymatuning! Lake Erie and Presque Isle Bay




South Pier

Lynn @ East End Angler; filed 6/27: There are walleyes straight off Shades Beach in 40 to 50 feet of water. Crawler harnesses are reportedly the best thing to pull; no plugs or spoons are producing right now. Best blade colors are purple, pink and green — watermelon pattern is the hot ticket. Up at Northeast Marina, they are catching some perch and bass in the marina. In PIB, the bayfront docks are giving up panfish and bass. On the North Pier, anglers are catching a few walleyes in the evening but the South Pier is silent.



Tim @ Presque Isle Bay Anglers; filed 6/27: Reports I am receiving from anglers on the North and South Piers state sheepshead are dominating their catches. However, catches off the city side dock areas are better. PIBA member Randy Deickhoff has found a good shore bite for walleye inside Presque Isle Bay; he has been using small deep-diving crankbaits and BC Bait Co LX Terry Bugs. It seems the walleye bite in the main lake

is still extremely inconsistent. A few walleyes are being caught off The Point and around the Dump, but it's hit and miss. The better opportunity for walleyes is west of Elk Creek to the Ohio line. Seems the first arrivals from the Western migration have finally moved into that territory. (See photos





Buckets Charters



Keith @ Dutch Fork Fishing Charters; filed 6/27: Going out of Walnut Creek, I've found the fishing good – but you have to be on fish that want to bite! We move constantly to find the right pod of fish that will cooperate. From Walnut Creek to Trout Run, walleyes can be caught from 30 feet all the way out to 70 feet. Our go-to baits include worm harnesses on inline weights, deep



crankbaits (Bandits, Bay Rats, Bagley's) and bottom bouncers with harnesses. Three colors of leadcore and a deep diver also works well, as

do weighted crankbaits 30 feet behind a 2-ounce snap weight, then 100 to 150 feet of line out. If you get into short walleyes or sheepshead, MOVE! Those little buggers will keep you busy, preventing you from getting to keepers! (See photos left & right)

RJ Graham (Tionesta); filed 6/20: Blaine Bartley and I took 4th place in an Erie bass tournament before Father's Day with four fish going a total of 17 lbs. (See photos to right)

VENANGO COUNTY

Justus Lake

Marilyn @ Blackwolfe Communications; filed 6/19: As part of our Smallmouth Quest 2021, Darl and I fished Justus Lake in Two Mile County Park. We were aware that Justus does not have a large smallmouth population, but it gives up the occasional monster smallie. It was our first time on Justus fishing from a boat in a number of years. We were anxious to try out our new Garmin Echomap Ultra 126SV on this two story-lake. From past experience, we figured the best chance for smallmouth was the deeper lower end of the lake, which is basically a big bowl. From the ramp we cut straight across the lake to the other shore and worked the entire shoreline out to 18 feet from there down to the dam, across the dam and back to the ramp. We were disappointed to only catch several very small largemouth bass – all less than 10 inches. Watching the readings on the sonar indicated there were very few fish or baitfish below about 12 feet – although we noted two large arches about 22 feet while cutting across the lake which we assumed were musky. Puzzled by what we observed and what we didn't catch, we have decided not to return to the lake unless we have the Justus Lake Guru, Angler Al, with us in the boat to give us guidance.

Oil Creek

Angler Al @ Buttermilk Hill; filed 6/26: My brother-in-law and I spent back-to-back days fishing on Oil Creek. Most of our success came from the Artificial Only Section using a fly rod. However, we did catch some trout some below that section using worms and smaller minnows. I caught the nicest fish — a colorful 17.5-inch brown trout. It hit a #10 Gridle Bug. Other trout were taken on San Juan worms, Purple Squirmies and Royal Price Nymphs. (See photo at right)

Allegheny River

Jeff @ Keystone Connection Guide Service; filed 6/25: Following a brief hiatus to allow river smallmouth bass to recover from their spawning period, my clients and I returned to the Allegheny in full force this past week. During low light conditions, with decent water clarity, the topwater bite was on. When the day brightened, Rapala X-Raps and flukes got hot. As the river picked up color from heavy NW PA rain, the bite changed to spinnerbaits. Multiple guide trips produced smallmouth bass up to 20.25 inches. (See photos below)

Wade Fishing for Summer Smallies By Pete Cartwright, river wade guide

One of my favorite times of the year is in the middle of summer. Water temperatures are at the highest of the year, the river flow is low, and the water is clear. I like to finesse fish in these conditions, using light line like 6-pound Gamma Edge on a GLoomis E6X 7'1 rod with a Shimano Stradic 2500 reel. Small baits like a Scared Fishless 2.5-inch Rude Tube. Smallmouth hunt best in clear water they can see far in the water and a big loud lure can spook them when they are not on a big bite. I'll have my clients use small baits to fish very shallow — at times only ankle deep — along banks and at the






head and tail of pools. They use 2 to 4-inch tubes or stick worms, and let them drift in the current to the bottom and then pop them up and let them drift again. Sometimes I have then open the bail to feed more line to the drift. This is a great tactic for wade fishing in rivers and streams for smallmouth in the heat of summer. GARMIN TIP by Jeff Knapp



Garmin chartplotters such as the Echomap UHD 93sv, which provide three sonar views, unlock subsurface features, particularly when you use them to their full potential. I combine traditional sonar, Clear Vu (down imaging) and Side Vu (side imaging) on a single screen. Side Vu is set in the upper half of the screen so it spans the width of the unit, which gives superior display of targets, rather than squeezing them into a portion (width-wise) of the

screen. Traditional and Clear Vu share the bottom half. Seeing both traditional and Clear Vu at the same time gives one a much better interpretation of targets. Objects such as submerged trees on traditional sonar, can blend fish in with branches. Seeing target separation on Clear Vu confirms fish swimming amongst the wood. The associated screenshot shows crappies in and above deep wood cove; the tree and fish are visible on all three sonar views. (Jeff may be reached at 724-902-6082 to book a guide trip.)
